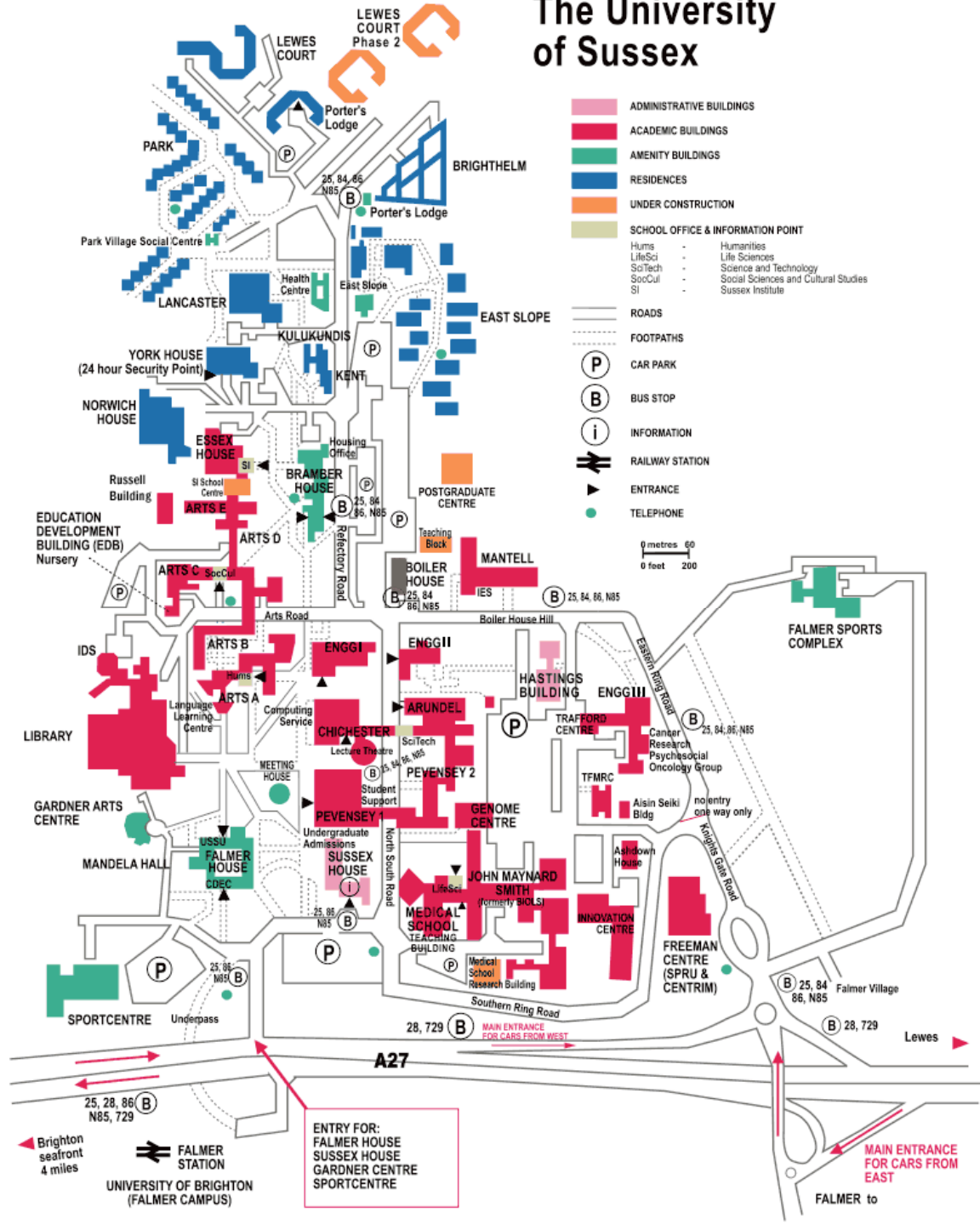
Finally, I offer thanks to each of you who by attending this conference will contribute immeasurably to its success.

Residential accommodation is in the Lewes Court buildings at the opposite end of the campus to the train station.

Internet access is available in Pevensey 1B5, which will be open to conference delegates, user names and passwords will be provided in the room. En-suite rooms also have internet access if you have a lap-top, you will need to get a phone card from York House.

Further facilities on campus during the University vacation period many of the facilities close in the evenings and on weekends. During the conference there will be a conference bar open in Bramber house at lunchtime and in the evenings. There are also further bars in the IDS building, the East Slope and the Gardner Arts Centre.

Travel

Trains: Brighton is a few minutes away on the train. The campus station is Falmer. From Brighton get off at Falmer, from Falmer get off at Brighton (this is the terminating station). The campus is sign posted from the station - please note that you need the University of Sussex campus (not the University of Brighton which is also signed from Falmer station).

Buses: The numbers **25, 25A, 25B** and **25C** buses leave from outside Bramber House on campus and go directly into Brighton. Alight at the Old Steine or Churchill Square for central areas. On returning to campus, they can be picked up in town from North Street, Western Road, Churchill Square, the Old Steine and Lewes Road.

Taxis: There are telephones to call taxis on to campus in the foyer of Bramber House. From town to campus – there are taxi ranks at Churchill Square and from North Street, opposite the Pavilion. From a venue, ask the staff to call you a cab.

Locality Information: Falmer, Brighton and Hove

The station that serves the University of Sussex campus is Falmer. There are regular and quick trains between Falmer and central Brighton. Falmer is a small village outside of Brighton in the South Downs. This is an area of outstanding natural beauty and the village of Falmer is north of the campus, there is The Swan public house at Falmer, which is within walking distance of the campus.

We recommend that you make the most of the proximity to Brighton. There are a wide range of restaurants, cafes, venues, shops and bars to suit all tastes. From the station, walk out of the main exit and down Queens Road towards the sea. With the station behind you there is a clock tower situated at the crossroads of Queens Road, West Street (which leads directly South down to the sea), Western Road (takes you West towards Hove) and North Street (takes you West towards Kemp Town). This central intersection orientates you at the centre of town and gives you three options:

- The seafront area, (Kings Road, the main hotels and bars, clubs and restaurants of the beach)
- The Lanes, North Laine, North Street, St James Street, Kemptown to the East, (this direction also has a wide range of eating places, bars and clubs and leads past the Brighton Pavillion and Palace Pier)
- Western Road, Hove and the 'restaurant strip' of Preston Street to the West
